

HOPE Position

on In-Vitro Diagnostics Regulation

Hospitals and other healthcare facilities are busy preparing for the implementation of the Medical Device Regulation (MDR), which is already quite a challenge.

In parallel, the introduction of the adjoining European regulation in the field of in vitro diagnostics (the IvDR), from May 2022, is of great concern to hospitals, healthcare services and laboratories. This date, in particular, is of great concern for all of us.

Ensuring the quality and continuity of the supply of in vitro diagnostics (IvDs) is an immense task. 34,000 products must be Notified Bodies (NoBo) certified and laboratories must demonstrate hundreds of Lab Developed Tests (LDTs) that they meet IvDR requirements. In addition, we see several bottlenecks that hinder proper implementation:

- The entire chain, from manufacturers and NoBo to healthcare institutions and laboratories, currently lacks guidance documents;

- The necessary expert panels and reference laboratories are not yet operational to guarantee safety;

- Only four NoBo are currently designated for IvDs certification.

The current Covid-19 pandemic hampers progress on the above and has also shown vulnerability to the availability of medical devices and IvDs in emergency situations. We want to prevent patient safety and continuity of care from being endangered.

In order to tackle the aforementioned problems, we see a number of possibilities:

- Extend the new EU-wide emergency marketing authorization scheme for IvDs;

- Determining a grace period of four years for products that do require NoBo for certification under the IvDR, but not under the old legislation. This treats IvDs in the same way as medical devices;

- Establishing a new real time frame for the introduction of the IvDR, taking into account the consequences of the corona pandemic.
